We had over 17,000 participants. For a new specialist I was beyond excited to have that type of enrollment
Marsha "learns" need for impact in the early 1980s Annual Conference "Estate Planning Study at Home Course causes Extension Financial Deficit"	Quite frankly, however, printing that many copies and mailing the lessons out once a week did put MSU Extension in a financial hole. So, during our Annual Conference the program got the "blame" for the deficit. Well, I was bummed so I decided I wanted to see if, because of the program, Montanans were taking action towards estate planning. I wanted to assess the impact !
Don Dillman: 1978 Mail and Telephone Surveys: The Total Design Method	At some Extension training, I learned about a book that explained how to conduct an evaluation tool for a program. The author of the book was Don Dillman (who was at the time at Washington State University). I listed potential actions I wanted people to take because of the self- study course. The evaluation survey tool was mailed to a "random proportional stratification" of the 17,000 participants. And I must brag a bit, I received a national award for that study.
