Twenty peer-reviewed proposals were presented as concurrent sessions during the 2016 ESP National Conference in four time blocks, with a variety of topics. If you didn't attend the conference, check out the slides provided by the presenters at our website, espnational.org!

Ignite (Lightening) presentations were new at our conference this year! These fast-paced talks accompanied by 20 slides in 5

minutes included topics, "Trauma-Informed Extension Service" and "Incentivizing, Rewarding and Celebrating Accomplishments." Recordings or slides from the presenters, Lynette Black and Cynthia Bond, will be available at the ESP website.

Eleven peer-reviewed poster presentations were displayed this year. Their authors were available for conversations during Tuesday's luncheon. Eight were of the poster presentations were selected for additional stipend. In addition, four informational tables by national ESP committees were shared.

The call for proposals for the 2017 National ESP Conference in Wilmington, NC, will be available for submission on the National ESP Website in January, and will be due mid-March.

Development Fund Campaign Contributions at National Conference

The 2017 Campaign began September 1, 2016, with \$2,970 in contributions given during the conference registration period and \$6.020 given during the actual conference, for a total of \$8,990. Half of the Auction proceeds of \$3,796 also go into the Development Fund to raise the total to \$10,888. Thank you to those donors for a strong response. A conference pin was given to those who contributed \$100 or more. All donors received a green Development Fund ribbon to add to their name tag.

The 2017 Campaign goal is \$20,000, and we ask the rest of you to step up with tax deductible contributions to reach that goal.

The 2016 Kickoff Challenge Campaign ended August 31, 2016, with \$24,750 being donated; 160 individuals/chapters/organizations gave.

The President's Key used to be auctioned off and the President was to buy it. Of course, friends helped in the funding. In recent years, the many supporters of the

President have made contributions in the President's name (an honorarium) to the Development Fund and the President is recognized by an Honorarium in his/her name. The individual/ organizational donor is recognized for their donation in the Key Level Recognition. Contribution for Patricia Dawson's Key have been received over a two-year period and totaled \$5,380 on October 27 at the end of the Conference. These 2015 and 2016 Campaign contributions went into the Development Fund and are included in totals above.

people. I walked away wanting to create an eye popping infographic for our program and communicate our program's work in simple, easy to understand language. She motivated me to take a long hard look at what we are doing in our program and why we are doing it. I walked away with new motivation to do the hard work it takes to continually make sure our programs are relevant, easy to understand, and easy to access.

During the first concurrent session I was able to learn about new programs that may enhance programing that we are already doing in my county. I learned that by engaging students through drawing, writing, and sculpting you can enhance their ability to connect to their environment. We do several programs that incorporate STEM and outdoor education; this session made me realize that there are some fun and easy ways to incorporate the arts into more of our current programs.

The second concurrent session shed some light on new types of publications that are headed our way—how Extension needs to be ready to evaluate new types of scholarship and publications as well as what is currently being done to make sure academe is ready to support Extension faculty to review these new efforts in scholarship. The session inspired new ideas about how I can take information that already exists but make it more client friendly. For example, taking fact sheets and turning them into infographics. I was also able to attend a concurrent session on teamwork. building a highly efficient team as well as understanding what qualities a dysfunctional team may have. Lastly, I was given the opportunity to team teach a concurrent session with my mentor Mike Knutz. What a great opportunity to present in front of a very supportive audience.

Overall the conference was very well run and had great personal and professional development

opportunities. We had the opportunity to have a long Q&A with Extension administrators that answered questions about the future of Extension and how they see us moving forward. It was so refreshing and exciting to know that we work in an organization that truly values innovation and technology. They really made me feel like I need to push harder to be more innovative and break outside of the norm of what Extension "normally" is to their community. It is our job to make sure that we keep this long running program relevant over the next 100 years! Looking back on the opportunity, I walked away feeling reenergized and ready to innovate to bring our long running programs into the now. ESP is a very supportive, close-knit group of professionals that understands that there is enough room in the world of Extension for all of us to be successful.

Global Relations Webinar-Survey is In!

ESP Global Relations Committee, in collaboration with the ESP Professional Development Committee and eXtension, held a webinar, "Creating International Extension Programs," on Monday, Sept 19th. More than 40 people from across the country participated. The webinar was facilitated my Mark Platten, Colorado State University. The panelists included: Michael McGirr - NIFA National Program Leader, International/Global Food Security; Dr. Paul Lachapelle - Community Development Specialist, Montana State University; Dr. Norma Samuel - Urban Horticulture Agent, UF/IFAS International Programs Advisory Team Vice Chair; and Dan Culbert, Retired Horticulture Agent, University of Florida/IFAS.

A post webinar survey was conducted and 24 participants replied. Of these people, 23 are current Cooperative Extension employees and one is retired. There were 14 states represented, including at least one state from each of the 4 ESP regions. 62% of respondents have participated in international programs where they have traveled to another country using knowledge from their Cooperative Extension work. Overall, more than 85% indicated that they learned a "good amount" of information from the webinar.

When asked what was the single most valuable thing learned, the topic most mentioned was the sharing of resources and links to more information. Other items mentioned in this open ended response included: networking and hearing what other universities are doing.

Additional suggestions for topics that could have been added to this webinar, or for topics in future webinars, were more in depth information in regards to program and funding sources and how to "catalogue" this information for future reference and sharing. The ESP Global Relations Committee has already started thinking about this topic. At the recent 2016 National ESP Conference, contact information was collected from those interested in sharing their experiences with others. We plan to develop a database and transition it into a catalogue of countries and people who have conducted international Extension work so we can learn from each other. In addition, we hope to have a web-based map with those contacts.

One person had an interesting comment regarding the definition of international Extension programs, "There needs to be differentiation between what is meant by 'international Extension programs,' such as programs for Extension staff, or programs for communities in other countries. There is a significant difference and basically one is doing development work in other counties and the other is strengthening your skills by traveling abroad. This webinar blurred those lines." Great comment! Something that we should discuss further, especially as we start to catalogue this information.

The ESP Global Relations Committee meets 5-6 times a year. There will probably be another webinar or information video produced this year based on the many topics suggested through the survey. Life Member Activities at Cape May, NJ

Rita Wood, Life Member in New Jersey, led the efforts for life member activities at the 2016 ESP National Conference. Life members and first timers were made comfortable at a reception held on the opening day.

Tuesday afternoon Rita had an interesting program in which Patricia Chappine first spoke on the topic of her book, *New Jersey Women in World War II*. She described the many civilian and military organizations in which women served and conditions in southern New Jersey for these women and their families. Then we went on a tour of local sites related to World War II. We visited one of the World War II Lookout Towers from which observers watched for German ships approaching and

entering the Delaware Bay downstream from Philadelphia and its many war related facilities. Gun batteries elsewhere were directed by these observers to fire on ships. While no enemy ships were fired upon close to shore, many ships on both sides were sunk 25 miles off shore during the war. A WWII vet told his story of serving on USAT Thomas H. Barry during the war and the guns he worked.

The remains of a sea-going concrete ship lie exposed just off shore where the storms have destroyed it. Then we passed the Cape May Lighthouse and walked out on the beach to see the remains of a secret bunker built to protect the entrance to the Delaware Bay. During the war it was hidden by trees but now it is

exposed as the beach has moved inland. It was a top secret gun bunker until one day when they test fired the guns! Then the police and everyone else was trying to find it but it was in a very restricted military base. Then we visited the Naval Air Station Wildwood Museum, home of the training school for dive bomber pilots. It was an interesting museum with many planes.

One final point of interest, there is a canal across the southern tip of New Jersey that was built and used during the war as a back door to get out behind the German U boats and is used by fishermen. This afternoon was a great experience for the life members who attended.
